GQA PAA\QVSET LEVEL 2 CERTIFICATE IN LAUNDRY OPERATIONS 500/8038/6

Who is this qualification for?

This qualification will provide recognition for Laundry Operatives working in all areas of the laundry sector and covers health and safety and maintaining effective working relationships. Learners have the option of completing units that deal with the washing process, finishing items, making up loads, inspection and dispatch. It has been developed specifically to meet a sector need and provide the opportunity for accreditation at level 2 for the laundry workforce.

Establishing underpinning knowledge and understanding relevant to laundries, this qualification is intended to be capable of delivery through both a taught programme of off-the-job learning or through workplace assessment (for those with access to the real workplace).

Learners must achieve 10 Units, all 4 Mandatory Units must be achieved and 2 units from each Option Group 1, 2 and 3. Knowledge and competence units must be taken in combination i.e. if unit LDC 4k is chosen, unit LDC 4c must also be completed; and vice-versa.

What is required from candidates?

Qualifications are made up of a number of units that have a credit value or credits.

These credits must be achieved in the correct combination from mandatory units and optional units.

The units are made up of the things you need to know and the things you need to be able to do to carry out your job safely and correctly. These are called Learning Outcomes, and all must be met to achieve the unit.

Qualifications are now required to indicate the total qualification time (TQT), this is to show the typical time it will take someone to attain the required skills and knowledge to meet the qualification criteria, this qualification has a TQT of 250 hours.

Qualifications are also required to indicate the number of hours of teaching someone would normally need to receive in order to pass the qualification. These are referred to as Guided Learning Hours (GLH). The GLH for this qualification is 140.

Assessment Guidance:

Evidence should show that you can complete all of the learning outcomes for each unit being taken.

Types of evidence:

Evidence of performance and knowledge is required. Evidence of performance should be demonstrated by activities and outcomes, and should be generated in the workplace only, unless indicated under potential sources of evidence (see below). Evidence of knowledge can be demonstrated through performance or by responding to questions.

Quantity of evidence:

Evidence should show that you can meet the requirements of the units in a way that demonstrates that the standards can be achieved consistently over an appropriate period of time.

Potential sources of evidence:

The main source of evidence for each unit will be observation of the candidate's performance and knowledge demonstrated during the completion of the unit. This can be supplemented by the following types of physical or documentary evidence:

- Accident book/reporting systems
- Safety records
- Training records
- Audio records
- Job specifications and documentation
- Delivery Records
- Photo/video evidence
- Work diaries
- Timesheets
- Telephone Logs
- Meeting records
- Records of toolbox talks



- Witness testimonies
- Correspondence with customers
- Notes and memos
- Equipment
- Prepared materials and sites
- Completed work
